Georgia's Breast Cancer License Tag Fund Awards \$300,000 to statewide programs for uninsured

ATLANTA – Thanks to citizens purchasing Georgia's Breast Cancer License Tags (BCLT), six organizations across the state have been awarded grants totaling \$300,000, for breast cancer education and screening, and treatment for underserved Georgians. Twenty-two dollars (\$22) of each tag purchased or renewed funds the \$300,000 in awards, administered by the Georgia Center for Oncology Research and Education (Georgia CORE) on behalf of the State Office of Rural Health in the Department of Community Health.

"While Georgia has increased breast cancer screening rates, not all women – particularly those without health insurance – receive appropriate screening or treatment," says Angie Patterson, Vice President of Georgia CORE and a 16-year breast cancer survivor. "The work this grant money supports will help identify breast cancer at an earlier stage, making treatment more effective."
