Georgia CORE sponsors Ken Burns' groundbreaking cancer special on GPB

Beginning on March 30 at 9pm, **Georgia Public Broadcast** will air "Cancer: The Emperor of All Maladies," a three-part, six-hour major television event from preeminent documentary filmmaker Ken Burns, in partnership with WETA, the flagship public broadcasting station in Washington, D.C. Based on the 2010 Pulitzer Prize-winning book, The Emperor of All Maladies: A Biography of Cancer by Dr. Siddhartha Mukherjee, the series is the most comprehensive documentary on a single disease ever made. Genomics education and awareness program growing across Georgia

Last September marked the end of a three-year grant funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention that created the Georgia Breast Cancer Genomic Health Consortium, Spearheaded by Georgia CORE in conjunction with the Georgia Department of Public Health, the consortium sought to reduce cancer disparities among high-risk minority women. Though the grant cycle has ended, the work continues with outreach efforts to not just high-risk minority women, but also underserved



and underinsured women. Through genetic screening, counseling, testing and education, the program targets young women with an increased risk for hereditary breast and ovarian cancer (HBOC) syndrome, with a goal to educate the healthcare community as a whole. "In addition to seeing thousands of underserved and underinsured patients all over Georgia, we have built relationships with genetic professionals that will help us continue to build awareness of the importance of genetic information," said Georgia CORE's genetics specialist, Alice Kerber, MN, APRN, ACNS-BC, AOCN, APNG. Increases in investments in cancer care equal decreases in cancer deaths

At the end of 2014, the **American Cancer Society** announced that the 22 percent drop in cancer mortality over two decades is a result of fewer Americans smoking, but also advances in cancer prevention, early detection, and treatment. With Georgia paralleling the national trend, the declining mortality rates data comes as Georgia's General Assembly considers Governor Nathan Deal's budget recommendations that dedicate a portion of Georgia's tobacco settlement funds to critically important Georgia-based cancer initiatives, including Georgia CORE.
